With the ever-changing needs of both older and younger people in our communities, it is crucial that Whitgift Care ensures its services continue to meet requirements and offer outstanding levels of care.

In February this year, The Whitgift Foundation was delighted to appoint the charity's first Director of Care, Dolores Pickersgill, to join its Leadership Team and to contribute to the overall strategic development of Whitgift Care and the Carers Information Service.

Here, Dolores introduces her role and her vision for the future of Whitgift Care.

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Whether we work in a social care setting, an acute trust, a community trust or a charity, what has always been very clear to me is that we are here to care for people. My career has spanned the sectors and what unites my experience is the people I cared for along the way.

We are all on a journey and throughout our lives we require support and care throughout that journey, whether that be from the midwife who safely delivered us, through to the palliative care nurse who helped to make our illness more bearable.

The Whitgift Foundation is a unique charity, founded by Archbishop John Whitgift, that has been looking after the young and old in Croydon for over 420 years. As the Foundation's first Director of Care, I am keen to review the various sectors with the focus being on integrated, holistic care, determined by our residents and clients, not the other way around. It is far too easy to become lost in the system; systems we create, and to lose sight of the person we are supposed to be helping.



I am pleased to see the tide has changed over recent years as we focus on "well-being focused care" instead of "symptom focused care" across all the sectors and I believe this is one of the things that unites us. Twenty years ago, whether in a hospital or a care home you were given a bath to keep you clean; now we recognise through research how important these sensory pleasures are.

Whitgift Care already recognises the importance of well-being and supporting our clients to be as well and as independent as they can be for as long as possible. With this in mind, in 2016 we started our 1596 Club, a day care service, which grew out of our commitment to reduce social isolation in the community. People from all walks of life come along to meet new friends, join in activities and share a meal. We receive great feedback from those who attend and the service also provides some "free time" for carers who know their loved ones are being well looked after while they take some time off.



We know Croydon has more than 30,000 unpaid carers which is why we provide the Carers Information Service who run the Carers Support Centre. Based in the heart of Croydon, the Centre is a place for carers to drop in for advice, a chat and a coffee. We provide practical help with form filling as well as sign post carers to other organisations when appropriate.

The team at the Centre are dedicated to trying to help lift some of the burden felt by carers who become isolated themselves as they dedicate their time caring for a family member or loved one.



So, to the future. My role is to continue the good work of the Foundation and to help build a future for Whitgift Care that continues to care for the people of Croydon, recognising we are living longer, often alone and with chronic conditions such as diabetes and dementia. As a result, I am looking forward to getting to know colleagues across Croydon who share my commitment to integrated and holistic care as working in partnership with external agencies and sharing best practice is key for all of us providing care so that we continually improve and find new ways to enhance the experience of our clients, patients and residents.



Dolores' career highlights:

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Dolores brings with her significant experience in the health care sector. She qualified as a registered nurse in 1984 before starting her career as a district nurse. Dolores has held a variety of senior positions including Deputy Chief Nursing Officer at London Bridge Hospital, Chief Nursing Officer at the Lister Hospital before moving to The Royal Hospital for Neuro-Disability as Executive Director of Nursing and Quality, Director of Infection Control and Associate Director of Patient Care.

Review of Whitgift School's production, The Sneeze, by David, Almshouses resident

I very much enjoyed Whitgift's Sixth Form production of The Sneeze on Thursday 21st March.

It showcased a collection of one act plays and stories by Anton Chekhov adapted by Michael Frayn, exploring the fine line between tragedy and comedy. One of the highlights for me was The Evils of Tobacco, a solo piece where what begins as a 'dry schoolmasterly

lecture' becomes something quite different, in a personal tale of woe wistfully explored with hilarious comic timing.

The piece that gives the play its title begins with an almighty and sudden sneeze from a lowly government worker sitting directly behind an official at the theatre, thus exploring with comedy issues of class.

FOUNDER'S DAY FACTFILE



- The site of the Almshouses was once occupied by the Chequer Inn and was purchased by Archbishop Whitgift for £200.
- The original letter from Queen Elizabeth I, or Letters Patent, authorising Whitgift to found the Almshouses, hangs on the wall of the Audience Chamber.
- Whitgift's name was originally loannes
 Whitegiftus, which is why an 'l' and 'W' is found
 on the Almshouses gable looking towards
 Crown Hill.
- Archbishop Whitgift died on 29 February 1604 at Lambeth Palace. His last words were 'Pro Ecclesia Dei' for the Church of God. His tomb lies at Croydon Minster.


Visit our Carers Support Centre in central Croydon
